1.01 System Components

1) Total Eclipse Controller, Gray (HYD01-08900-11)

The actual components delivered will depend on the configuration of the system ordered. The Total Eclipse Controller is an integral part of the Total Eclipse Chemical Management System, which also includes these components:

- Machine Interface – Accepts washer signals and converts them to safe, low-voltage inputs.
- Product Dispenser – Provides product transfer to the wash machine.
- Flush Manifold (optional) – Available for water flush chemical transfer applications.

The Total Eclipse Controller is compatible with any Hydro Laundry dispenser.

1.02 Features

The Total Eclipse Chemical Management System uses technological advances to create an innovative system that adapts to the electronic and language needs of global clients. The easy-to-read, seven-line screen displays plain-text formula names, customized by language and customer. Formulas and controller setups can be programmed at the controller or with Formula Editor computer software and uploaded via a USB flash drive (16 GB or smaller) to each controller. Reports on product usage, costs per formula, system settings, and diagnostics are easily downloaded to the USB flash drive and viewed or imported into various financial software.

Designed for maximum versatility in OPL or large laundry wash machines, selectable operating logic allows operation with trigger signals from fully-programmable washers or with manually triggered signals (or cycle time extenders) from non-programmable, fixed-time washer

NOTE: Always use proper lockout or tagout procedures when servicing the dispenser.



CAUTION!

This manual was written and illustrated to present the basic installation, operation and servicing instructions of the Total Eclipse Chemical Management System. Guidelines are suggested in reference to the preferred method of installation, but the variety of equipment and the surrounding environment will dictate the actual installation of the Total Eclipse.

1.02 Features (continued)

Feature	Description
Maximum Formula Power	Up to 20 different formulas let you tailor your chemical requirements to each wash classification. Program the controller via the keypad or upload formulas and settings from a USB flash drive that has been programmed on a personal computer using our Formula Editor software.
Eight Product Capability	Up to eight products, each with three dispense amounts (A, B, and C) and a delay, may be connected. The maximum dispense amount is 99.99 oz. (2999 ml.).
Compatibility	Use with components from earlier Hydro laundry systems or adapt to future updates by adding modular components and loading updated software at the customer's site.
Easiest Operation	User-friendly, large screen display offers seven lines of text and customized formula and product names. Setting, formula, and production information are retained even when controller is powered off. Two pre-installed languages are standard (English plus another, based upon area of sales). Language choices may include Spanish, French, Portuguese, German, and Swedish. All operating and programming menus are in the installer-selected language.

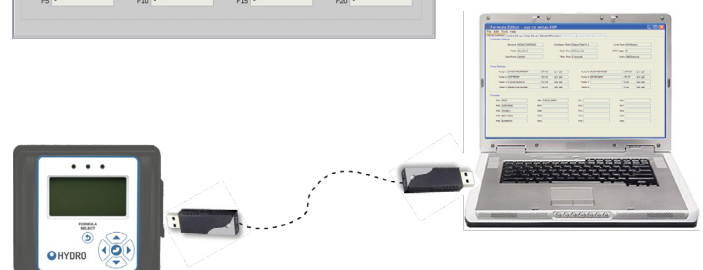
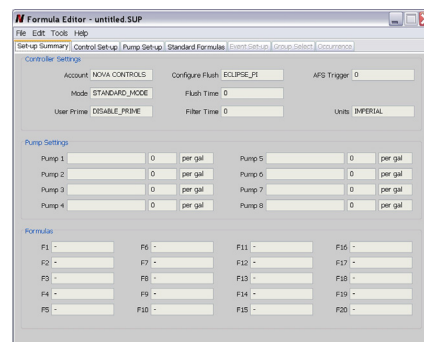
1.03 Formula Editor

The optional Formula Editor reduces installation time and cost by allowing an off-site technician to create a set of efficient and cost-effective settings and formulas on a personal computer.

An installer can load these Setup Files (via a USB flash drive) to multiple Total Eclipse installations. With the Formula Editor, up to 20 industry-specific formulas can be quickly created and managed as part of a cohesive chemical program.

Take a Setup File (Formulas and Settings that were created with Formula Editor software on a computer or read from a Total Eclipse controller) and write the Setup File to another Total Eclipse controller via a USB flash drive.

Another use for the USB Flash drive is to read reports from the controller and view them on a computer.

1.04 Operation

The Machine Interface (MI) receives supply signals from the laundry machine at pre-determined times in the wash formula. The MI sends these signals to the Total Eclipse controller.

The controller functions are governed by the Operation Mode selected, the features enabled, and the formula rules. In most modes, the laundry operator can change the formula or load size, according to the load type.

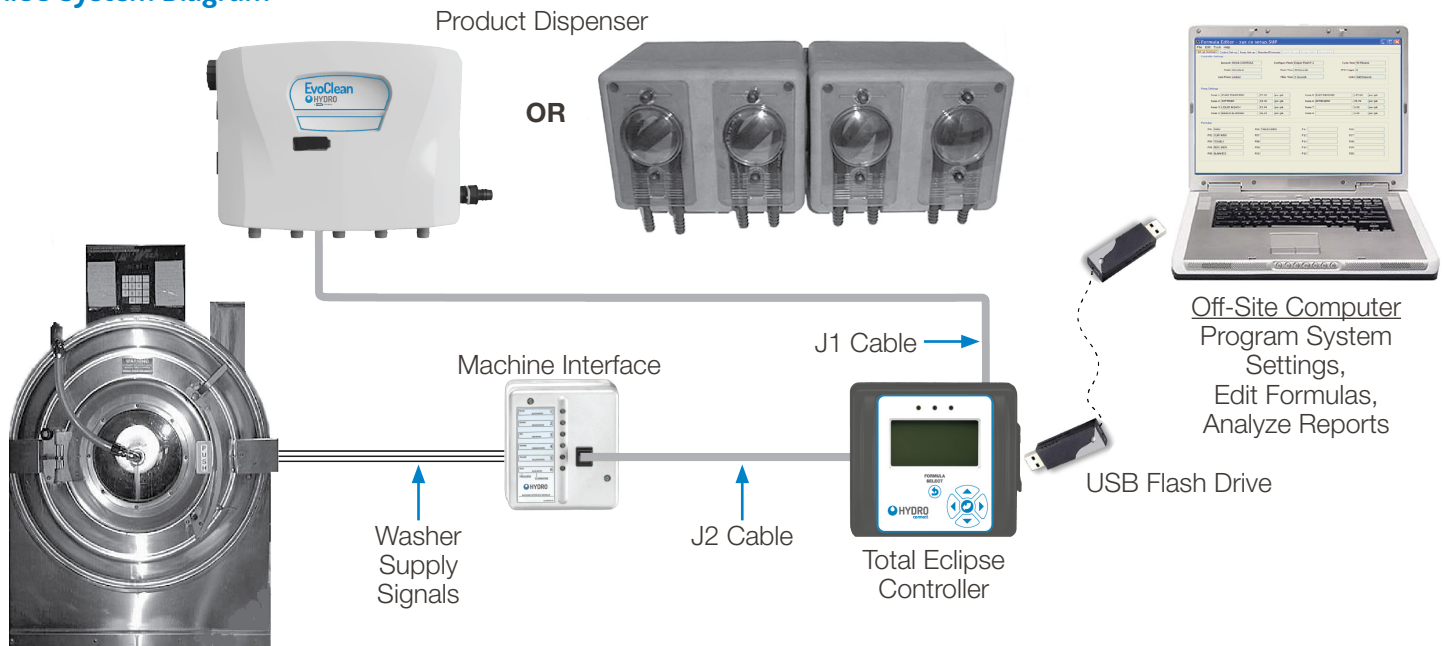
The controller activates the dispenser to inject specific products, based on the “supply signals” from the laundry machine for completely automatic control of each product delivery.

The MI is installed near the laundry machine control wiring area, often to the exterior of the laundry machine, and can accept supply signal voltages ranging from 24-240VAC or from 22-24VDC.

The various product dispensers operate on either 115VAC at 60 Hz, 220VAC at 60Hz, or 230VAC at 50 Hz. The product dispenser is also what supplies the low voltage power to the controller and provides an interface for the optional flush manifold.

A Flush Manifold (optional for pumpstands) provides a way of using a water flush to transfer product to the laundry machine.

1.05 System Diagram



NOTE! As the traditional product dispensers have been pumps, some standard terms such as “Count Pump” and “Pump Interface” are used in this document, even though you may be using an eductor dispenser (such as EvoClean).

1.06 Modes of Operation

Each operating mode has a different combination of rules for creating and editing settings. These rules affect subsequent dispensing. When selecting a Mode of Operation, consider both the type and capabilities of the laundry machine and the variety of linen to be washed. Use the following table to compare modes. Read the following section for a detailed explanation of each Operating Mode and the accompanying feature.

1- AFS is intended for use with fully-programmable, microprocessor-controller laundry machines.

2- 8-Product control is allowed, but products 3 and 7 are linked to each other, as are products 5 and 8 linked to each other.

3- Event Mode is designed to work with fixed-cycle washers.

4- Occurrence Mode is best suited for laundry machines in which trigger signals do not have specific functions.

1.07 Standard Mode (default)

The most common mode used for North American installations, Standard Mode allows the operator to quickly select a formula from a list of formulas. A formula can include up to 8 products, each with three possible programmable amounts (A, B, and C amount). Each washer trigger signal notifies the corresponding product to dispense the set amount (i.e. trigger 1 starts product 1, trigger 2 starts product 2, etc.). All amounts and delays are based on the currently selected formula. Non-flush systems can dispense up to six (6) products simultaneously. Please note that eductor dispensers have a built-in flush manifold, always utilize flush and cannot dispense products simultaneously.

Standard Mode is the only mode that features Auto-Formula Select via the AFS Trigger. When using an 8-product pump interface (PI) this mode links products 3 and 7 to each other and links products 5 and 8 to each other. (See also: "Formula Rules" on page 14 for dispensing rules and exceptions.)

1.08 Relay Mode

The Relay Mode is designed for use with programmable laundry machines and allows the washer's trigger signals to directly control the amount of chemicals dispensed. Products dispense for the duration of the trigger signal, after being qualified by the Signal Filter Time. Trigger 1 runs product 1, trigger 2 runs product 2, etc. Relay Mode does not use the formula settings, other than Default Load Weight (or Actual) for reports. It does not use Cycle Time.

If Flush is enabled in Relay Mode, any products attempting to run simultaneously will automatically be run in a queue with a 2 second pre-flush between each product run and the post-flush after all queued products have run.

To use Relay Mode:

- Go to Installer Menu > Initial System Setup > Operation Mode and select Relay Mode.
- Go to Installer Menu > Installer Service > Service Products > Calibration to calibrate products.
- Go to Installer Menu > Program Formulas > F01 > Set Default Weight and set a Load Size for F01 (Formula 1).

No other programming is needed.

1.09 Event Mode

The Event Mode option allows automatic operation of washers that offer no supply trigger connections, such as fixed-cycle washers. Product dispensing is paced by machine events, rather than fixed-time as in Standard Mode. Four trigger signals are used. The typical connections are:

Trigger 1	Power on signal: Washer Door Switch (Wash Cycle Indication)
Trigger 2 and/or 3	Fill signal: Hot or Cold (Triggers Dispensing)
Trigger 4	Drain (Concludes one Event and allows another Event to occur.)
Trigger 5 and 6	- Not used in this mode. -

1.10 Event Mode Rules

Up to 16 Events can be programmed, and up to 3 products (each with A, B, and C amounts) may be added to an Event.

A product can only be used once per Event, but the same product can be used in multiple Events. If a product is used in more than one Event, the A amount dispenses in the first Event in which the product is used, the B amount dispenses in the second Event in which the product is used, and the C amount dispenses in the third (and all subsequent Events) in which that product is used. If there is no C amount, there will be a maximum of two (2) runs per wash cycle for that product. No Count Pump is used in Event Mode, nor is Cycle Time used. Non-flush systems can start up to three products simultaneously.

1.11 Group Mode

In the Group Mode option, the six trigger signals are placed into four, pre-defined groups (see the following table). Between 0 and 3 products may be assigned to each group. A product may be used in more than one group. The trigger signals determine which group of products dispense their programmed formula amounts, and in which order. All dispensed amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula.

Group	Trigger Signal Inputs
Group 1	Trigger 1 and / or 2
Group 2	Trigger 3 and / or 4
Group 3	Trigger 5
Group 4	Trigger 6

1.12 Group Interlock Rules

If a group is set to run more than once per wash cycle, Group Interlock must be OFF and all products within the group must fully run to allow repeat activation of the group when it receives the trigger signal.

When Group Interlock is ON: A group can only run once per wash cycle (regardless of the number of triggers received) and there is a 5-minute lockout period after the Count Pump runs. During lockout, trigger signals are ignored.

When Group Interlock is ON, the wash cycle ends either five (5) minutes after the count pump has run or when the programmed Cycle Time is reached, whichever occurs first.

When Group Interlock is OFF: A group can run more than once per load.

When Group Interlock is OFF, the cycle ends immediately after the count pump has run or when the programmed Cycle Time is reached, whichever occurs first.

Non-Flush systems can run up to 6 products simultaneously if two groups are triggered simultaneously and each group has 3 products assigned.

1.13 Occurrence Mode

Occurrence Mode is best suited for washers in which trigger signals do not have a specific function. Any qualified trigger (1–6) will start an Occurrence. Each new qualified signal, on any trigger, signifies a new Occurrence within the current wash cycle; triggers occurring with two seconds of each other are considered one Occurrence. The first trigger starts Occurrence 1, the second trigger starts Occurrence 2, and so forth.

Up to 16 occurrences can be programmed, with up to 3 products dispensing per occurrence. All dispensed amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula. If there is no product assigned to an occurrence, nothing is dispensed and the occurrence acts as a “space holder.”

Occurrence Mode differs from Event Mode in the following ways:



WARNING! The last product to run in Occurrence Mode should always be the Count Pump.

- The wash cycle begins when the first product is dispensed.
- A qualified signal from any trigger signal initiates an Occurrence.
- There is no specific wash cycle indication. A wash cycle ends after the Count Pump runs, or when the programmed Cycle Time is reached, whichever occurs first.

1.14 Pump Mapping Mode

In the Pump Mapping Mode, the six trigger signals are placed into four, predefined wash steps (see the following table).

Wash Step	Trigger Signal Inputs
Prewash	Trigger 1
Auto-Formula Select	Trigger 2
Mainwash (2H/2C)	Trigger 3 and / or 4
Spare	Trigger 5
Final Rinse	Trigger 6

- Between 0 and 3 products may be assigned to each wash step. A product may be used in more than one wash step.
- The trigger signals determine which wash step and products dispense their programmed formula amounts, and in which order.
- All dispensed amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula.

2.00 features and options

The following features and options, which may be set during the Initial System Setup, affect the product dispensing sequence in conjunction with the chosen mode of operation.

2.01 Auto Formula Select (AFS)

AFS is only available when operating in Standard Mode. AFS allows the installer to choose a trigger signal that will select and run any programmed formula using a timed signal. The AFS signal does not need to be qualified by a Filter Time when it is selecting a formula. After a formula has begun, the trigger chosen for AFS may also be used as a product trigger, which must then be qualified by the Filter Time before the dispense will occur. The AFS trigger should not be a trigger signal that starts or ends a formula. (The first product triggered starts the formula and the Count Pump ends the formula.) The AFS trigger signal must occur before a wash cycle begins or after a wash cycle has ended, not while a formula is running. The washer supply signal must be programmed for a total of 2 seconds multiplied by the desired formula, for example:

a 2-second signal = Formula 01 ... a 4-second signal = Formula 02 ... a 6-second signal = Formula 03 ...

When AFS begins, the controller displays "SELECTING F[##]." Every two seconds, the next formula number [##] displays, until such time as the signal ends, at which point the selected formula is displayed again (e.g. if the washer supply signal is set for 20 seconds, F10 WHITE SHEETS is selected to run and displays on the Home Screen).

2.02 Count Pump

In all Modes of Operation (except Event Mode), a Count Pump is used to determine when the wash cycle is completed. The system records a complete wash cycle after all programmed amounts for the Count Pump are dispensed. In Event Mode, a sequence that begins with Trigger 1 ON and ends with Trigger 1 OFF indicates a complete wash cycle and counts as one load. In Relay Mode, the Count Pump is fixed as Product 1. In Standard, Occurrence, Group Mode and Pump Mapping the default Count Pump is the highest number for which an amount is programmed. In these four modes, the default Count Pump may be overridden by the installer, who may select a Count Pump other than the default. The Count Pump can correctly register a load only if the following three conditions are met:

- At least one amount is programmed for the Count Pump.
- The Count Pump must be the last to run.
- The Count Pump is requested to run for all programmed amounts (Standard, Group, or Occurrence modes). If two or three amounts have been assigned to the Count Pump, it must be requested to run at least two or three times, respectively.

2.03 Cycle Time (Standard, Group or Occurrence Modes ONLY)

Cycle Time acts as a backup shut off to ensure that the cycle ends and product is not wasted in the event of a formula run error. At the Cycle Time limit, the wash cycle stops, even if the Count Pump has not yet run. In Group Mode, the setting for Cycle Time is also used as the Group Interlock time.

Cycle Time should be set to at least 5 minutes longer than longest estimated time that any wash cycle will run. Cycle Time can be set to 00 (OFF), or between 30 – 99 minutes. The default is 90 minutes. For loads (such as a soak load) that typically last longer than 99 minutes, it is recommended that the Cycle Time be set to 00 (OFF).

NOTE: If Cycle Time is set to 00 (OFF), the Count Pump must run in order to end the wash cycle.

2.04 Flush Operation (ONLY for a flush-compatible P.I. NOTE: Eductor P.I.'s are flush-compatible.)

Flush prevents incompatible chemicals from combining. When a flush-compatible Pump Interface (P.I.) is selected during Initial Set-up, flush can be enabled by setting a Flush Time, up to 99 seconds. For all flush compatible P.I.'s (except eductor P.I.'s) if the Flush Time is set to zero (0), flush is disabled. For eductor P.I.'s the allowable flush time range is 10 to 99 seconds.

When Flush is enabled:

Only one product can be dispensed at a time. If there is a request for multiple products to dispense at the same time, a flush-enabled system causes each product to dispense sequentially. (See also "Trigger Spacing and Product Queue" on page 14.)

- A fixed, 2 second pre-flush occurs before the product dispenses.
- Flush occurs continuously for the entire time the product is dispensing.

2.00 features and options (continued)

2.05 Non-Flush Operation

Allows from three to six products to run simultaneously, depending upon the Mode of Operation selected. Systems using an eductor dispenser, which always uses flush, cannot run products simultaneously.

2.06 Formula

A formula specifies which product dispenses and in what order when a trigger signal is received. In Modes of Operations that use formulas (Standard, Event, Group, Occurrence and Pump Mapping), a product may be set to dispense multiple times, with up to three different amounts (identified as Amounts A, B and C) and a delay. A product will only dispense when at least one amount (not zero) is set. A formula may also establish a default load weight, a name that is added to the formula number and, in some Operation Modes, the Count Pump number.

2.07 Formula Rules

Standard Mode, Event, Group and Occurrence Mode:

If only the A amount is programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in the dispensing of Amount A. Additional requests within the same wash cycle are ignored.

If only A and B amounts are programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in the dispensing of Amount A and the second request results in the dispensing of Amount B. Additional requests (after the second request) are ignored.

If all three amounts (A, B, and C) are programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in the dispensing of Amount A, the second request results in the dispensing of Amount B and the third request results in the dispensing of Amount C. Subsequent requests (after the third) result in the dispensing of Amount C. The dispensing sequence is reset when the wash cycle ends.

Pump Mapping Mode:

In Pump Mapping Mode, pumps that are allocated to Prewash (Trigger 1) will only dispense the A amount. Amounts entered for B and C amounts will be ignored.

Pumps allocated to the Mainwash (Trigger 3 and 4) will dispense the B amount on the first trigger and the C amount on the second trigger. Amounts entered for A will be ignored.

Pumps allocated to the Spare (Trigger 5) and Final Rinse (Trigger 6) will dispense the A amount on the first trigger, the B amount on the second, and the C amount on the third trigger. The dispensing sequence is reset when the wash cycle ends.

2.08 Trigger Spacing and Product Queue

Products can be triggered to dispense in several different ways, depending on the Mode of Operation. If a trigger for a product to run occurs and the product is already dispensing, the trigger is ignored. In Occurrence, Event, Group or Pump Mapping mode, this could result in not running some or all of the products called for by a trigger signal.

With a Pump Interface (P.I.) with Flush enabled, different products that attempt to run simultaneously are placed in a queue and then dispense in sequence. A product is added to the queue whenever there is a valid trigger for it, as long as it is not currently running and is not already in the queue. The queue allows for up to 7 products (other than the currently dispensing product), to be "queued up" (waiting to dispense in sequence).

NOTE: It is imperative that the installer allow plenty of time between triggers to ensure that a product (or group of products) will dispense for each of its triggers.

2.00 features and options (continued)

2.09 Trigger Signal Filter Time

Signal filter time is the amount of time that a trigger must remain continuously ON before being recognized as a qualified trigger and starting the dispense. The factory default time is 2 seconds. Longer times (10, 20, 30, 60 or 90 seconds) may be set if washers present problems, i.e., unreliable signals falsely triggering dispenses. The Auto Formula Select (AFS) signal does not use a signal filter time.

2.10 8-Pump Interface

Regardless of the selected Mode of Operation or the Flush setting, products 3 and 7 and products 5 and 8 cannot run simultaneously on an 8-Pump Interface. They can be requested to run at the same time, but they will run sequentially, based on the Mode of Operation, product order, or delays set.

Standard Mode:

In Standard Mode, products 3 and 7 are triggered by the same trigger signal, Trigger 3. Products 5 and 8 are also triggered by the same trigger signal, Trigger 5.

If Amounts A, B, and C are programmed for both product 3 and product 7, then on the first instance of Trigger 3, product 3 Amount A will dispense and then product 7 Amount A will dispense. On the second instance of Trigger 3, product 3 Amount B will dispense and then product 7 Amount B, and so on.

Pump Mapping Mode:

In Pump Mapping Mode, up to 3 products can be assigned to each Pump Map.

The A, B, and C amounts will dispense according to the pump map they are assigned to. See section 2.07 "Formula Rules" on page 14 for more information.

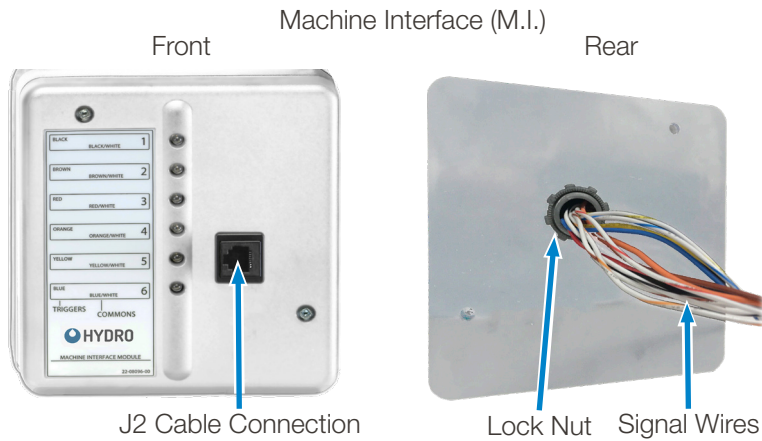

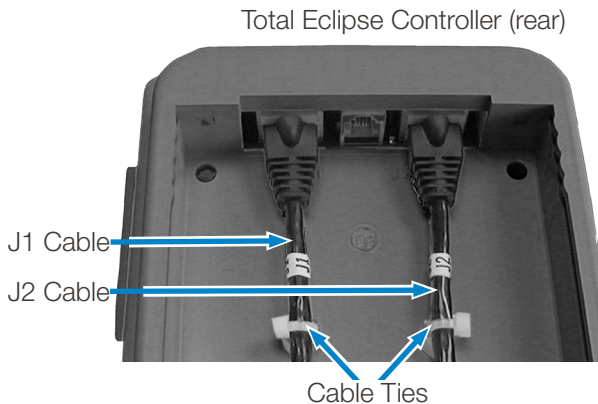
3.00 installation

3.01 Machine Interface Installation

- 1) Route MI signal wires through 1/2 inch knock-out on washer (within the wiring area). Use lock nut on MI 1/2 inch nipple to secure MI to washer.



- 2) Connect cable marked J2 into Machine Interface. Bundle excess J2 cable outside washer and connect other end to the connector labeled J2 on the rear of the Controller. Note that certain regional/customer units may utilize a DB9 style connector in lieu of the standard J2 connector.
- 3) Connect cable marked J1 from the dispense module to the connector labeled J1 on the Controller. Note that certain regional/customer units may utilize a DB9 style connector in lieu of the standard J2 connector.
- 4) For additional cable strain relief, secure J1 and J2 cables to controller tie-down posts with cable ties (aka tie wraps, zip ties).



NOTE: The certain regional/customer units may utilize a DB9 style connector in lieu of the standard J1/J2 connector.

3.02 Signal Wire Installation

The Machine Interface will work with any signal voltage between 24 – 240VAC or 22 – 24VDC. With DC signals, polarity must be observed, where common connects to negative. The signals must be positive voltages.

Supply Trigger Wiring:

- 1) Identify the washer supply signals. Check with technical service or with the washer manufacturer if you are not sure of the connections.
- 2) Identify the Mode of Operation to be used. Use appropriate terminal connectors to connect the signal wires to the Machine Interface wires, based upon the table on the next page.



WARNING! The Total Eclipse controller is intended to be installed by a qualified technician only, in accordance with all applicable electrical and plumbing codes.

DISCONNECT POWER to the laundry machine and dispenser during installation and/or any time the dispenser cabinet is opened.



WARNING! Keep the Machine Interface and the communication cables away from high voltage wires and relays. NEVER run the J1 and J2 cables parallel with high voltage lines.

NOTE: This manual describes only the installation and programming of the Total Eclipse Controller, which is a portion of the Total Eclipse Chemical Management System. Please refer to the reference manual included with your dispenser or upgrade kit for additional instructions.

Electrical wiring connections for supply triggers are to be done inside the supply junction box. (See Section 3.03 Supply Trigger Wiring on page 18) for connection information.)

NOTE: The maximum distance for the J1 cable from the product dispenser to the controller is 75 feet.

“J” cables are available in 15 and 30 foot lengths. A coupler is available to join cables together for longer distances under 75 feet.

“J” cable runs longer than 75 feet require the use of break out boxes and hard wiring. Contact Hydro Systems Co. for details.



WARNING! Always verify all voltage sources with a voltage meter.

DISCONNECT POWER to the laundry machine and dispenser during installation and/or any time the dispenser cabinet is opened.

3.04 Trigger Signal Wiring Notes

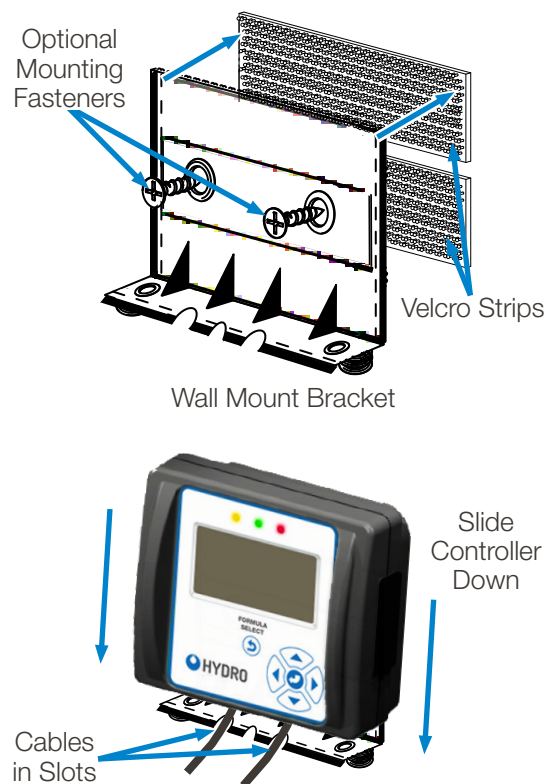
- If one or more product signals are not used, they do not need to be connected.
- If you are triggering more than one product from a single signal, connect all of the Machine Interface signal wires for those products to that signal.
- Protect any unused wire with a wire nut. If the washer has only a single common, wire nut all the common wires together.
- One of the 6 LEDs on the Machine Interface will light up when the corresponding valid signal is received.

3.05 Total Eclipse Controller Mounting

The Total Eclipse controller may be mounted either horizontally (such as on top of the washer) or vertically (such as on the front of the washer).

Mount the unit using the self-adhesive strips provided, or for added security, you may use nuts and Allen bolts or other fasteners (provided) as is appropriate to the mounting surface.

- 1) Position the controller for easy access to the keypad and display screen.
- 2) Mark a mounting location that is on, or close to, the washer. The mounting surface must be clean and dry.
- 3) Join the four Velcro-style strips firmly together to form two pair.
- 4) Peel backing from one strip of each pair and place, adhesive-side down, in each recess on the mounting bracket. Press firmly for good adhesion.
- 5) Peel backing from opposite strips and press mounting bracket onto smooth, clean surface (use alcohol wipe, if needed) at marked location.
- 6) With cables connected, slide controller front down onto mounting bracket (controller back), guiding cables into slots and pressing down firmly until front and back snap into place.



3.06 Set Operating Language, Date & Time on Start-Up

After all electrical, plumbing, and mechanical installation is complete, apply power to the Total Eclipse Controller. At the first power up, the LANGUAGE menu follows the splash screen to allow menu language selection. Choose one of the menu languages that are pre-installed in each controller (English or Spanish for the Americas; English or German in the EU); or download additional Total Eclipse Controller menu language files from the Hydro Systems website to a USB flash drive. Installing a language from a USB flash drive to a controller can only replace the non-English menu language in the controller as the English language option is permanently installed.

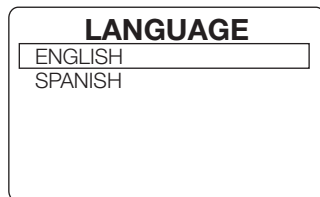

1) Move the selection box, using the Up / Down arrow keys,   until it frames your desired language (US controller defaults shown).

3.08 Changing Operating Language After First Power Up

1) Shut off power to Total Eclipse by unplugging the J1 cable or shutting off dispenser power switch. (Settings and logged data are retained.)

2) Connect a USB flash drive and restore power. The LANGUAGE menu will appear. Select the other operating language on the controller, or select a different language file that may be contained on the USB flash drive. Formulas and setup information (operating mode, calibration, etc.) are retained when a operating language is changed. Custom formula and product names are not translated when a change is made to the operating language.








3.09 Setting the Date and Time


After setting the operating language on the first power-up from the factory, or whenever the controller is powered up afterward, the DATE & TIME menu is displayed.

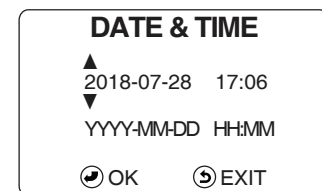
When installing the controller, you **must** change the Date and Time to the current date and time, as this controls the data contained in reports.

The display is in ISO 8601 standard format: **YYYY-MM-DD HH:MM** (Year-Month-Day Hour:Minute). The clock is a 24-hour clock, with no AM/PM setting. Once set, the date and time (real-time clock) are retained by battery power if the main power is turned off or if there is a power failure.

Setting the Date and Time:

- 1)  The first number of the year is selected as the active digit, indicated  by the double-arrow cursor.
- 2)   You can change the value of the active digit by pressing the Up / Down arrow keys.
- 3)   To move to the next digit, press the Right arrow key. To backspace, press the Left arrow key.
- 4)  When the correct date and time are displayed, press the Enter key to save the settings and launch the Total Eclipse Home Screen. (See section 5.02 Home Screen on page 20 for more information.)

Note:  To exit the Date & Time menu without saving changes and move to the Home Screen, press the Exit key. Also, the display will automatically exit the Date & Time menu if no keys are pressed for 15 seconds, without saving changes.

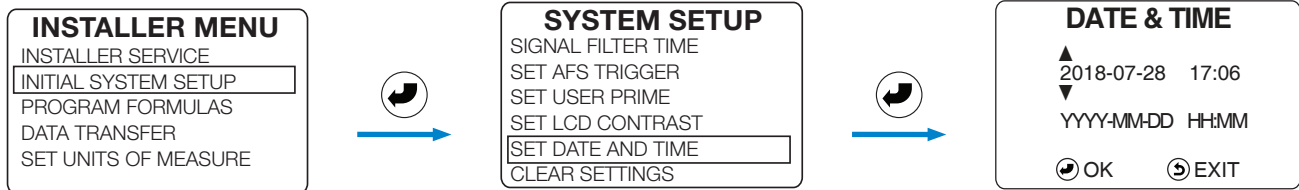

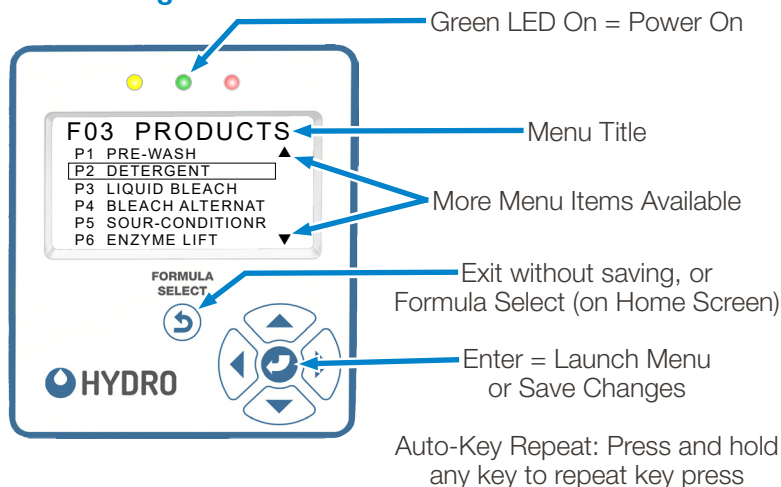
The Total Eclipse Controller's back-lit screen displays seven lines of text, with on-screen prompts, in the operating language selected by the installer.

A green LED indicates power is on. The six-button keypad is used by the machine operator for formula selection and modification during normal operation; and by the installer during installation, service, and data transfer.

The USB port accepts a Type-A USB flash drive (16 GB or smaller). It is used to read and write formulas and settings between the flash drive and the controller. It is also used to write Summary Reports from the controller to the USB flash drive. In addition, it may also be used to install future firmware updates.

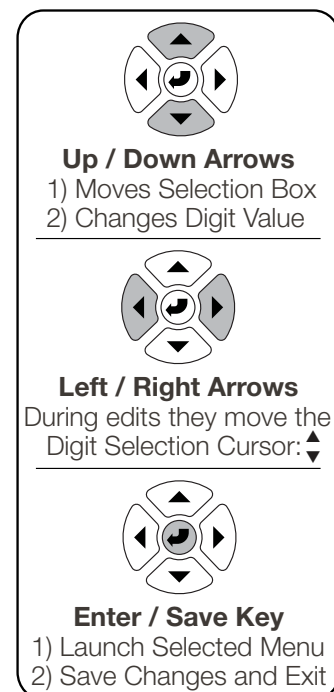

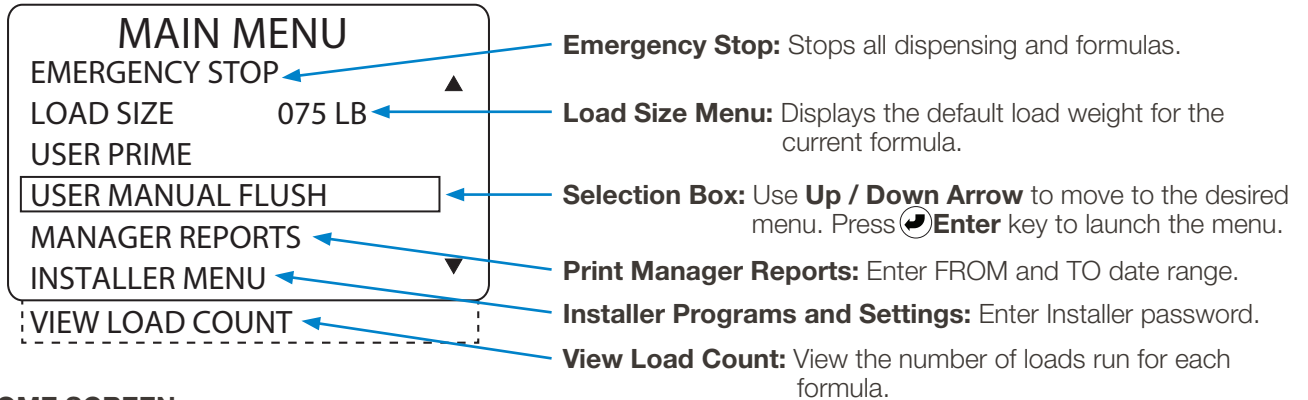

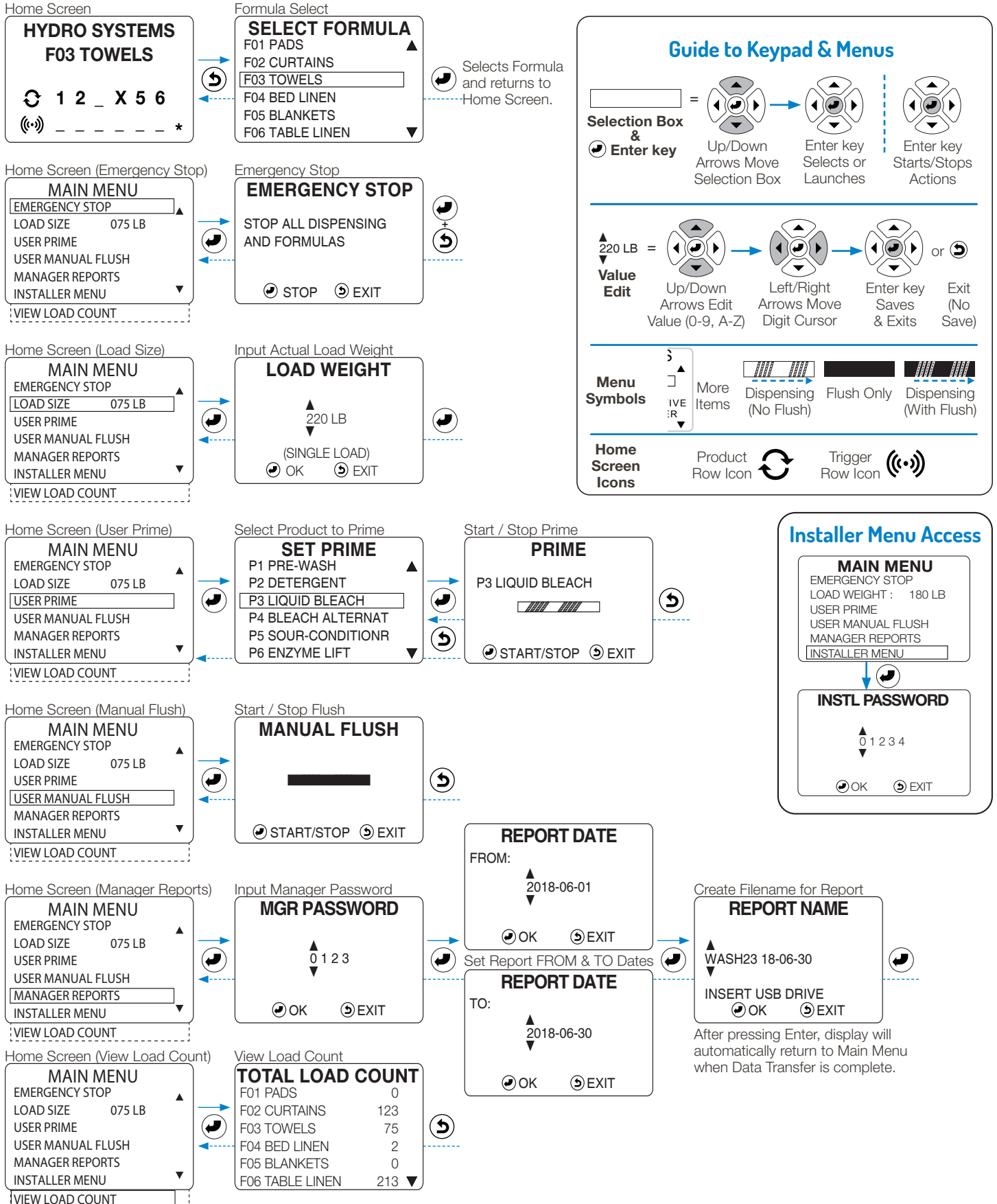

Note! “Power Saver”: If the display is on some screen other than the Home Screen, and there are no key presses for 15 seconds, the display reverts to the Home Screen.

If the controller is idle (no key presses and no cycle activity) for 15 minutes, the **Power Saver** feature shuts off the display backlight. Pressing any key returns the controller to normal operation.

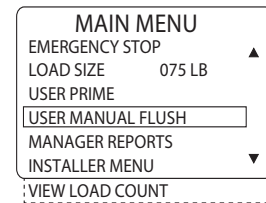
5.10 User Manual Flush (if enabled)

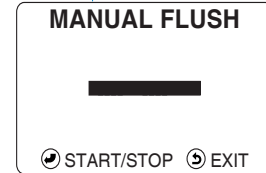
In order to use USER MANUAL FLUSH a flush compatible P.I. must be installed, along with a flush manifold, and the Flush Time must be set to a value greater than zero. (Note: Eductor P.I.'s are flush compatible.)

The default Pump Interface setting (see 8.12 "Set Pump Interface" on page 40) is ECLIPSE P.I. with FLUSH TIME set to 00 = OFF. When the P.I. or Flush Time settings to not allow flush, "DISABLED" will be displayed.

- 2) In the Flush menu, press the Enter key to start the flush, and press the Enter key again to stop the flush.

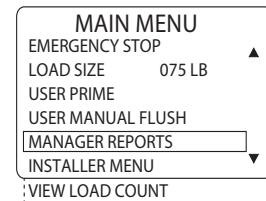
5.11 Manager Reports (with Manager Password)

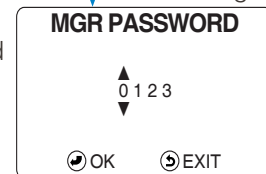

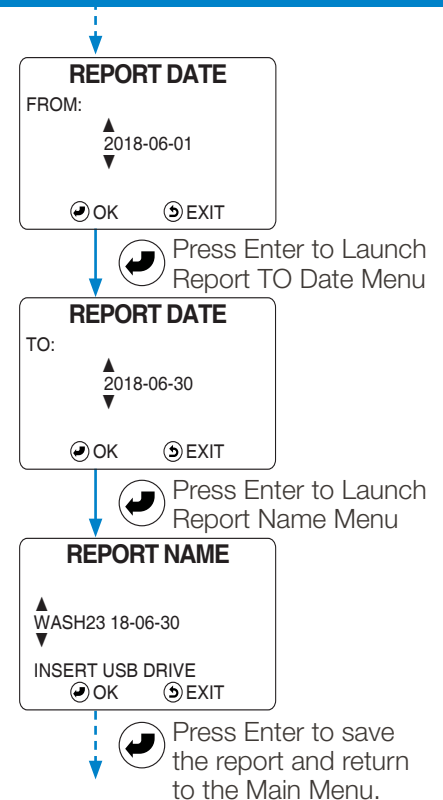

- 6) Insert a USB drive into the lower (Type A) USB port on the side of the Total Eclipse controller and press the ENTER key (↵) to save the Productivity Report to the USB drive. When the save is complete the display will return to the Main Menu.

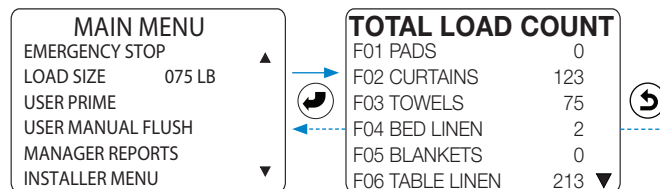

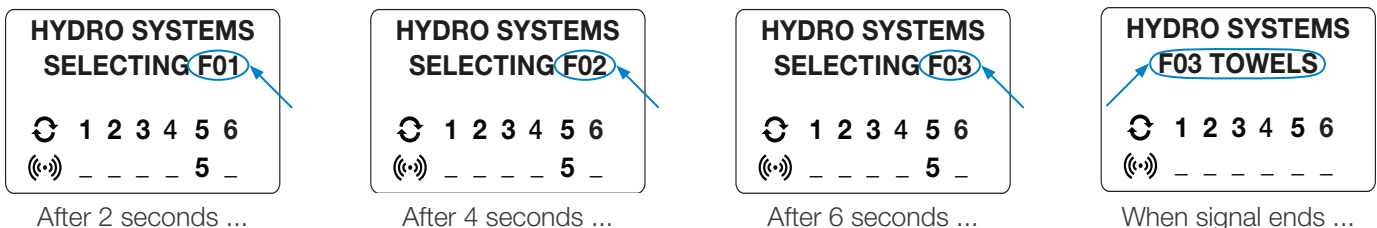

5.13 About Auto Formula Select (AFS) Operation

AFS allows an installer-chosen trigger to select any programmed formula with a timed signal from the washer. That washer supply signal must be programmed for a total of 2 seconds multiplied by the formula number. With AFS set to Trigger 5:



When AFS begins, the controller displays “SELECTING F[##].” Every two seconds, the next formula number [##] displays, until such time as the signal ends, at which point the selected formula is displayed on the Home Screen (e.g. as shown above, if the washer supply signal is set for 6 seconds, F03 TOWELS is selected to run).

NOTE: There is no signal filter qualifying time for the AFS trigger. See 2.01 Auto Formula Select (AFS) on page 13 for more details. Also, when running Pump Mapping Mode, trigger 2 is always dedicated to AFS.

6.01 Overview (Service and Settings using Controller Keypad)

Initial system setup and Formula programming can be done using either the controller's Installer Menu and five-button keypad, or the computer-based Formula Editor and transferred to the controller using a USB flash drive (see Chapter 11 on page 52).

 Settings that can ONLY be adjusted by the controller display and keypad are marked in this section with this small icon. Those settings are: **Installer Password**, **Manager Password**, **Machine Name**, **Company Name** and **Calibration**.

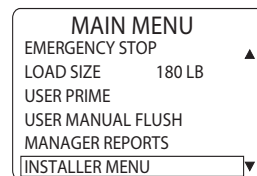

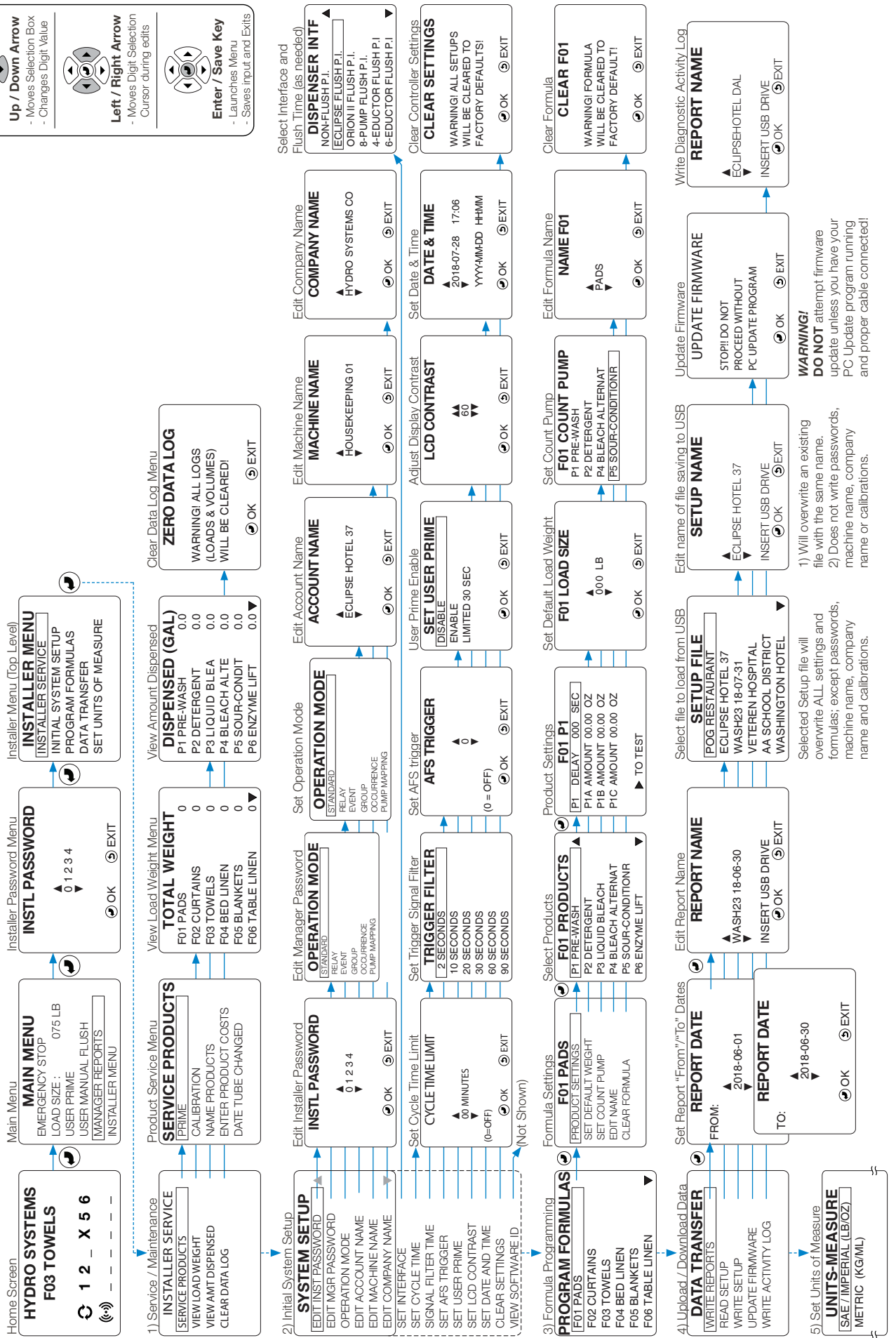

7.01 Service Products

The SERVICE PRODUCTS menu can be used to prime or calibrate products, typically during the initial setup.

NOTE: A product name only appears with the product number if a name was input or was part of a USB Setup File Transfer.

- 1) In the INSTALLER MENU, move the Selection Box onto the INSTALLER SERVICE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) On the INSTALLER SERVICE menu, move the Selection Box over the SERVICE PRODUCTS menu item and press the Enter key.

7.02 Prime

This feature is used to fill or “prime” the intake tube after a product container or tube change. An animated progress bar will indicate when the PRIME function is running.

From the SERVICE PRODUCTS menu, select PRIME and press the Enter key, to launch the SET PRIME menu. The SET PRIME menu displays a list of available products (with names, if previously input or uploaded by the installer).

- 1) Press the Up / Down Arrow keys to select a product to prime.
- 2) Press the Enter key to launch the PRIME screen for the chosen product.
- 3) Press the Enter key to start priming, and an animated progress bar will be displayed.
- 4) Press the Enter key again to stop priming, and the animation will stop.
- 5) Press the Exit key once to select another product to prime, or twice to return to the SERVICE PRODUCTS menu.

7.03 Calibration



You must calibrate all products you will use in a formula, using the method best suited for the system installed. Programmed formulas will not run if products are not calibrated. In Relay Mode, you must calibrate products in order to establish product output.

Choosing a Calibration Method:

TIME: Use when working with large displacement dispensers, such as our large laundry peristaltic pumps or double diaphragm air products, when calibrating products with a flush manifold installed or when calibrating eductor laundry dispensers.

VOLUME: Use this method only for medium volume dispensers, like 12-18 oz/min (355-532 ml/min).

MANUAL: Use if you already know the product's flow rate in oz/min.

7.03 Calibration (continued)

Equipment Needed:

Both time and volume calibration methods require a graduated measuring container to measure the amount of product dispensed.

When calibrating a pump, measure the output of the pump, capturing the product dispensed into the graduated measuring container.

To calibrate an eductor system, measure how much product the chemical intake draws out of the graduated measuring container.

In either case make sure the dispenser intake is primed before starting the timed calibration process. When using the timed method, the measuring container must be able to hold at least the amount of product this system can dispense in 20 seconds.

7.04 Time Calibration

- 1) On the Calibration menu select CALIBRATE (TIME) and press Enter.
- 2) At CALIBRATE (TIME) select a product to calibrate and press Enter.
- 3) Once a product has been selected, the calibration countdown display will appear, with the selected product and its previous 20 second calibration value displayed. Get the measuring container ready, either to collect the output of a pump, or to be drawn out of by an eductor.
- 4) Press Enter to begin dispensing as the countdown begins (with a 2 second delay if flush enabled). Allow the countdown to go to 0.0 at which point the DISPENSED VOLUME display will appear.
- 5) Input the volume of product that was either pumped out or drawn in by an eductor. Then press Enter to complete the product calibration.

7.05 Volume Calibration

- 1) On the Calibration menu select CALIBRATE (VOLUME) and press Enter.
- 2) At CALIBRATE (VOL.) select a product to calibrate and press Enter.
- 3) Once a product has been selected, the volume calibration display will appear, with the selected product indicated. Get the measuring container ready, either to collect the output of a pump, or to draw product out of for an eductor.
- 4) Press Enter to begin dispensing (with a 2 second delay if flush enabled). Press Enter to stop the calibration when 8 oz (250 ml) of product has been pumped into the measuring container or drawn out by an eductor.
- 5) The time required to dispense is automatically calculated, no data input is needed. Use the VIEW CALIBRATION menu to confirm the new value.

7.06 Manual Calibration

- 1) On the Calibration menu select CALIBRATE (MANUAL) and press Enter.
- 2) At MANUAL CALIBRATE select a product to calibrate and press Enter.
- 3) Once the product is selected, the input screen for the manual calibration will appear. Enter the predetermined value in oz/min.

7.07 Name Products (optional)

This allows a name to be added to a product number, "P1 PRE-WASH" for example. The name is not translated if the controller language is changed.

- 1) At the SERVICE PRODUCTS menu, move selection box to NAME PRODUCTS. Press the Enter key to launch SELECT PRODUCT menu.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrows to select the product to name (or rename).
- 3) Press Enter to launch the NAME PRODUCT (P#) input screen. The current name (if any) is displayed with the first letter selected for entry.
- 4) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move through letters, numbers, hyphen, underscore and space that can be input for that digit.

7.10 View Load Weight

This menu displays the total weight washed, by formula, since the last time the data log was cleared (see 7.12 “Clear Data Log” below).

- 1) On the INSTALLER MENU menu, move the selection box onto the INSTALLER SERVICE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) Put the selection box on VIEW LOAD WEIGHT and press the Enter key.
- 3) The TOTAL WEIGHT menu will display the total weight washed by formula.
- 4) Use the Up / Down Arrows to view all formulas.

7.11 View Amount Dispensed

- 2) The “Zero Data Log” screen will appear, with which all data logs can be cleared.

CAUTION! All logged data for load weight, total loads run, and product amounts will be reset to zero.

- 3) Press the Enter key to indicate it is “OK” to clear all data logged and reset counters to zero. Or press the Exit key to cancel this function.

NOTE: Past information for Manager Reports, Summary Reports, and the Activity Log is no longer available when the Data Log is cleared.

Also, when the Data Log reaches the point where it is completely filled, any new info that is recorded will overwrite the oldest record. It is recommended that required reports be run at least every 30-60 days to avoid loss of information.

8.01 Edit Installer Password

The Installer Password may be changed from the factory default (01234) to any five-number password.

WARNING! Be sure to note any new Installer Password. If the password is lost, the Installer Menus will be inaccessible and the controller will have to be returned to Hydro Systems and reprogrammed to factory defaults.

- 1) On the INSTALLER MENU menu, move the selection box onto the INITIAL SYSTEM SETUP menu item and press the Enter key.

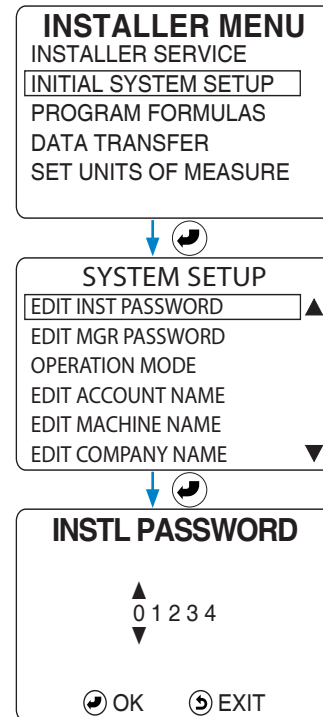

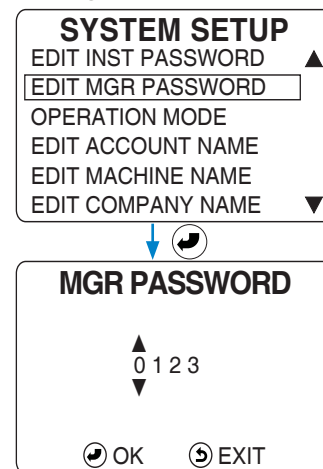

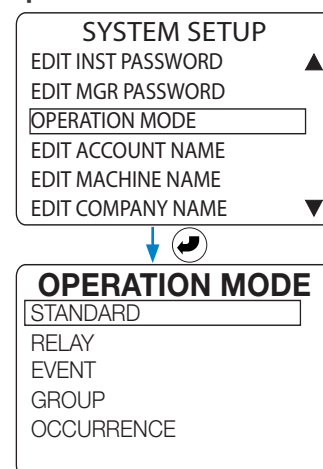

8.05 Set Operation Mode to Relay

Relay Mode dedicates control of products to the washer supply signals. Products are dispensed for the duration of supply signal time, after being qualified by the signal filter time.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, put the selection box on the OPERATION MODE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) When the OPERATION MODE menu appears, move the selection box onto the RELAY menu item and press the Enter key to select that operation mode and return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu, or press the Exit key to cancel the operation mode selection.

8.06 Set Operation Mode to Event

Event Mode uses programmed formulas for automatic operation with washers that offer no supply trigger connections, like fixed cycle washers.

Product dispensing is paced by machine events, rather than fixed-times as in Standard Mode. Event mode requires four signal connections to the MI (see section 3.03 Supply Trigger Wiring on page 18).

An Event occurs when a trigger signal is detected on Triggers 2 or 3 (the hot and cold fill valves).

Up to 16 Events can be programmed (most washers use 5), and up to 3 products (with A, B, and/or C amounts) may be added to an Event.

To decide which products to include in an event, it is important to read and understand section 1.10 Event Mode Rules on page 11 and the section 2.07 Formula Rules on page 14.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, put the selection box on the OPERATION MODE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) When the OPERATION MODE menu appears, move the selection box onto the EVENT menu item and press the Enter key to select that operation mode and launch the EVENTS Menu, or press the Exit key to cancel the operation mode selection.
- 3) On the the EVENTS menu, sixteen events are displayed, Event 01 to 16.
- 4) Move the selection box onto the Event you wish to configure and press the Enter key to launch the E# PROD SELECT menu.

Any products selected to dispense from a previous event configuration will already have a check mark to the right of the product identifier.

- 5) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box among the products and press the Enter key to select or deselect products.

Up to three products can be selected for a single event. Trying to select more than three products for a single event will generate an error.

- 6) When all the desired products have been selected for this event press the Exit key to return to the EVENTS menu; where another event may be selected for configuration.
- 7) When all events needed have been configured, press the Exit key repeatedly to return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu.

8.07 Set Operation Mode to Group

Group Mode places the six trigger signals into four, pre-defined groups (see table). Between 0-3 products may be assigned to each group. A product may be used in more than one group. The trigger signals determine which group of products dispense their programmed formula amounts, and in what order.

Group	Trigger Signal Inputs
Group 1	Trigger 1 and / or 2
Group 2	Trigger 3 and / or 4
Group 3	Trigger 5
Group 4	Trigger 6

All product amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula. If a trigger for a product to run occurs and the product is already running, the trigger is ignored. The installer **MUST** allow enough time between triggers to ensure a product (or group of products) can run for each of its triggers. Also, if a product is included in a group, but is not in the currently selected formula, the product will not run when triggered. This could result in not running some or all of the products called for by a trigger signal.

1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, put the selection box on the OPERATION MODE menu item and press the Enter key.

2) When the OPERATION MODE menu appears, move the selection box onto the GROUP menu item and press the Enter key to select that operation mode and launch the GROUP MODE menu, or press the Exit key to cancel the operation mode selection.

Group Interlock: If Group Interlock is set to ON:

a) Each product group runs only once per washer load (regardless of how many times the washer turns on supply signals).

b) The wash cycle ends either 5 minutes after the Count Pump has run or when the programmed Cycle Time is reached, whichever occurs first.

Set Cycle Time to the desired Group Interlock Time (See sections 8.14 Set Cycle Time Limit on page 40 and 1.12 Group Interlock Rules on page 11).

1) On the GROUP MODE menu, move the selection box onto the SET GROUP INTERLOCK menu item and press the Enter key to launch the GROUP INTERLOCK menu.

2) Move the selection box onto OFF (to disable Group Interlock) or ON (to enable Group Interlock) and press the Enter key to confirm your selection. If you enable Group Interlock, remember to set the Cycle Time to the desired Group Interlock Time.

3) Press the Exit key to return to the GROUP MODE menu.

Set Group (Add Products to a Group):

1) On the GROUP MODE menu, move the selection box onto the SET GROUPS menu item and press Enter to launch the GROUPS menu.

2) At the GROUPS menu, select the group you want to add products to and press the Enter key to launch the G# PROD SELECT menu. Any products selected to dispense from a previous group configuration will already have a check mark to the right of the product identifier.

5) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box among the products and press the Enter key to select or deselect products. Up to three products can be selected for any group. Trying to select more than three products for a group will generate an error display.

6) When all the desired products have been selected for this group press the Exit key to return to the GROUPS menu; where another group may be selected for configuration.

7) When all products needed have been assigned to their groups, press the Exit key repeatedly to return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu.

8.08 Set Operation Mode to Occurrence

The Occurrence Operation Mode option is best suited for washers in which trigger signals do not have a specific function.

An Occurrence is a qualified signal received on any of the designated inputs. Each new qualified signal signifies a new Occurrence within the current wash cycle. Simultaneous triggers (i.e. triggers that occur within 2 seconds of each other, or whatever the filter time is set to) are considered one (1) Occurrence.

Up to 16 Occurrences can be programmed, with up to 3 products (each with A, B, and C amounts) dispensing per Occurrence. Each product can only be used once per Occurrence and Pump Mapping, but the same product can be used in multiple Occurrences. All dispensed amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula. If there is no product assigned to an Occurrence, nothing is dispensed and the Occurrence acts as a “place holder.”

Each time a particular product is dispensed within the formula and Occurrences, it will sequentially step through the programmed A, B, and/or C amounts. If the product is to be dispensed in two Occurrences, the B amount will be dispensed for the second Occurrence (even if it is set to zero (0)). If the product is to be dispensed in three or more Occurrences, the C amount must be set and that amount will be dispensed in the third Occurrence and all subsequent Occurrences within that wash cycle.

If a trigger for a product to run occurs and the product is already running, the trigger is ignored. This could result in not running some or all of the products called for by a trigger signal. If a product is included in an Occurrence, but is not in the currently selected formula, the product will not run when triggered. See also section 1.13 Occurrence Mode on page 12 for additional rules about this mode.

NOTE: It is imperative that when the installer is programming the washer signals, to allow plenty of time between triggers to ensure that a product (or group of products) will run for each of its triggers.

1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, put the selection box on the OPERATION MODE menu item and press the Enter key.

2) When the OPERATION MODE menu appears, move the selection box onto the OCCURRENCE menu item and press the Enter key to select that operation mode and launch the OCCURRENCES menu, or press the Exit key to cancel the operation mode selection.

3) On the the OCCURRENCES menu, sixteen Occurrences are displayed, Occurrence 01 to 16.

4) Move the selection box onto the Occurrence you wish to configure and press the Enter key to launch the O# PROD SELECT menu.

Any products selected to dispense from a previous occurrence configuration will already have a check mark to the right of the product identifier.

5) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box among the products and press the Enter key to select or deselect products to be dispensed when this occurrence is triggered.

Up to three products can be selected for a single occurrence. Trying to select more than three products for a single occurrence will generate an error display.

6) When all the desired products have been selected for this occurrence press the Exit key to return to the OCCURRENCES menu; where another occurrence may be selected for configuration.

7) When all occurrences needed have been configured, press the Exit key repeatedly to return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu.

8.09 Set Operation Mode to Pump Mapping

Pump Mapping Mode is used in most European installations. In this mode, the six trigger signals are assigned to four, predefined wash steps (see table on right).

Between 0-3 products may be assigned to each wash step. A product may be used in more than one step. The trigger signals determine which wash step will dispense their programmed formula amounts, and in what order.

All product amounts and delays are based upon the currently selected formula. If a trigger for a product to run occurs and the product is already running, the trigger is ignored.

The installer **MUST** allow enough time between triggers to ensure a product (or group of products) can run for each of its triggers.

Also, if a product is included in a wash step, but is not in the currently selected formula, the product will not run when triggered. This could result in not running some or all of the products called for by a trigger signal.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, put the selection box on the OPERATION MODE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) When the OPERATION MODE menu appears, move the selection box onto the PUMP MAPPING menu item and press the Enter key to select that operation mode and launch the PUMP MAPPING menu, or press the Exit key to cancel the operation mode selection.

Set Wash Step (Add Products to a Wash Step):

- 1) After Selecting PUMP MAPPING in the previous step, select the Wash Step / Event you want to add products to and press the Enter key to launch the E# PROD SELECT menu.
- 2) Any products selected to dispense from a previous set up will already have a check mark to the right of the product identifier.

Use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box among the products and press the Enter key to select or deselect products.
- 3) Up to three products can be selected for any wash step. Trying to select more than three products for a wash step will generate an error display.
- 4) When all the desired products have been selected for this wash step press the Exit key to return to the previous menu where another wash step may be selected for configuration.
- 5) When all products needed have been assigned to their groups, press the Exit key repeatedly to return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu.

8.10 Edit Account Name (optional)



For the input of a client or account name that appears on reports. The name can use capital A-Z, 0-9, underscore, hyphen or space.

- 1) In the SYSTEM SETUP menu move the selection box to the EDIT ACCOUNT NAME menu item and press the Enter key to launch the ACCOUNT NAME input screen. The current name (if any) is displayed with the first letter selected for entry.

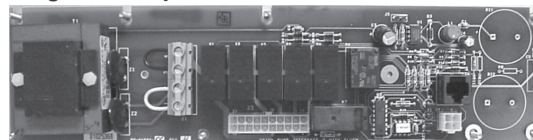
About Setting the Pump Interface:

NOTE! "Pump Interface" is a generic term for the printed circuit board inside a product dispenser that receives signals from the controller and operates the pump motors or eductor solenoids. Each pumpstand or eductor dispenser has a unique P.I. board. The following illustrations may help to identify the P.I. board.

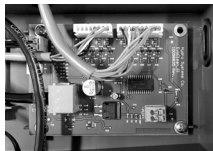

The Total Eclipse controller only controls flush when used with a flush-compatible Hydro Pump Interface (P.I.) board. The boards can be used with or without a flush manifold, while an eductor dispenser has a flush manifold built in. When flush mode is enabled, only one product may run at a time, and if multiple products are triggered simultaneously, they are placed in a queue to run sequentially.

8.13 Set Pump Interface



NOTE! It is important to select the correct P.I. (corresponding to the dispenser) to ensure proper and safe operation. A warning message will appear if a controller configured for eductors is connected to a peristaltic pump dispenser.

Here the appropriate Pump Interface for this installation must be selected so the proper control signals are sent to correctly dispense products. See “About Setting the Pump Interface” on the previous page for details.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SET INTERFACE menu item and press the Enter key.
- 2) On the SET INTERFACE menu, move the selection box onto the Pump Interface (P.I.) that corresponds to the dispenser being used and press Enter to select. The factory default selection is “ECLIPSE FLUSH P.I.”.

8.14 Set Flush Time (Enable Flush Operation)

- 1) When a flush compatible P.I. board is selected, the FLUSH TIME menu will launch, for setting the flush time after dispensing, in seconds. Also see Flush Operation (for a Flush-compatible P.I. ONLY) on page 13. All flush compatible P.I. boards will default to 10 seconds. Eductor flush can be set from 10 to 99 seconds. For peristaltic installations where a flush manifold is NOT installed, the Flush Time can be set to zero to disable flush, but **a flush time MUST be used with any flush manifold, to avoid hazardous chemical mixing!** With flush enabled there will always be a fixed 2-second pre-flush before dispensing, as well as the post-flush using this Flush Time setting, up to 99 seconds.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move through the values 0 to 9, and use the Left / Right arrows to move the digit selection cursor.
- 3) Press Enter to save the Flush Time value and return to the SET INTERFACE menu or press the Exit key to cancel the Flush Time input.



NOTE! The TE controller only controls flush with a flush-compatible P.I. board. With flush mode enabled, only one product may run at a time. If multiple products are triggered simultaneously, they are queued to run sequentially.

8.15 Set Cycle Time Limit

Set Cycle Time Limit for Standard, Group, or Occurrence Operation Mode unless the installation has loads that last longer than 99 minutes. For these extra-long loads, the Cycle Time Limit can be set to zero (0=OFF) and will no longer end a wash cycle, causing complete reliance on the Count Pump to end the wash cycle.

Cycle Time should be set to five minutes longer than the longest wash cycle. The range is 0 or 30 - 99 minutes. The factory default is 90 minutes. If Group Mode is selected, the Cycle Time is also used as the Group Interlock time. For additional information see section 2.03 Cycle Time (Standard, Group, or Occurrence Modes ONLY)” on page 13.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SET CYCLE TIME menu item and press the Enter key to launch the CYCLE TIME LIMIT input screen.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move through the values 0 to 9 and the Left / Right arrows to move the digit selection cursor.
- 3) Press Enter to save the Cycle Time value and return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu or press the Exit key to cancel the Cycle Time input.

8.16 Set Signal Filter Time

The Signal Filter Time is the amount of time a trigger signal needs to be on continuously before the controller will accept the signal as valid. Only when a trigger has been on as long as the setting (2 seconds is the default) is the signal considered “qualified” (a true signal). Use a longer filter time if a washer produces unreliable signals that falsely triggers products. This one filter time setting is used for all trigger signals, except an AFS trigger.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SIGNAL FILTER TIME menu item and press the Enter key to launch the TRIGGER FILTER selection menu.
- 2) On the TRIGGER FILTER menu, use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box onto the desired signal filter time and press the Enter key to select that setting, or press the Exit key to cancel the selection.

8.17 Set [AFS] Auto-Formula Select Trigger (Standard and Pump Mapping Mode Only)

The AFS feature of the Standard operation mode allows a timed trigger signal from the washer to automatically select and run any programmed formula. The Trigger Filter Time is not used on an AFS signal. The default trigger setting for the AFS trigger is 0 (Off).

NOTE! To avoid confusion do not to use a trigger signal that starts or ends a formula for AFS. (The first product triggered starts a formula and the Count Pump ends the formula.) See “2.01 Auto Formula Select (AFS)” on page 13 for more information.

To use an AFS trigger the installer must program the corresponding washer supply signal to energize for a total of 2 seconds multiplied by the desired formula number. For example:

- a 2 second signal = Formula 1 ($2 \times 1 = 2$)
- a 4 second signal = Formula 2 ($2 \times 2 = 4$)
- a 6 second signal = Formula 3 ($2 \times 3 = 6$), and so forth.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SET AFS TRIGGER menu item and press the Enter key to launch the AFS TRIGGER menu.
- 2) On the AFS TRIGGER menu, use the Up / Down Arrows to indicate the desired AFS trigger (0-6) and press the Enter key to save that setting..

NOTE! In pump Mapping Mode, trigger 2 is always dedicated for AFS. To use AFS with pump Mapping, Simply enable it in the System Setup Menu.

8.18 Set User Prime

The User Prime feature (when enabled) allows the machine operator to prime products without needing a password. By default User Prime is disabled. The ENABLE choice will allow the operator to determine the length of time prime will run (up to 5 minutes), while the LIMITED 30 SEC choice will limit the User Prime to 30 seconds per product, per wash cycle.

- 1) At the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SET USER PRIME menu item and press the Enter key to launch the USER PRIME configuration menu.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrows to move the selection box to one of the three options: DISABLE, ENABLE or LIMITED 30 SEC.
- 3) Press Enter to save the configuration and return to the SYSTEM SETUP menu or press the Exit key to cancel the USER PRIME configuration.

8.19 Set LCD Contrast

The contrast on the controller's display screen can be adjusted to adapt to the environment and the viewing needs of the user. The default setting is 60; the range is 30 (light) - 99 (dark). The two, double-arrow cursors  indicate that both digits will increase or decrease at the same time.

- 1) On the SYSTEM SETUP menu, move the selection box down until the menu scrolls up, and onto the SET LCD CONTRAST menu item and press the Enter key to launch the LCD CONTRAST adjustment menu.
- 2) At the LCD CONTRAST menu, use the Up / Down Arrows to adjust the display contrast. A higher value will increase contrast (darken the screen) and a lower value will reduce contrast (lighten the screen).
- 3) Press the Enter key to save the contrast adjustment and return to the SYSTEM SETUP, or press the Exit key to cancel the adjustment.

8.20 Set Date & Time

This menu allows the date and time to be set, as needed. Keep the date and time correct, as they are important for creating accurate reports! For instructions on changing the date or time, see section 3.09 Set Date & Time" on page 19. These setting are retained if the power is turned off.

8.21 Clear Settings to Factory Defaults

Clears all controller settings (passwords, mode of operation, formulas, trigger assignments, flush, etc.) and restores the controller to the factory default settings. Once CLEAR SETTINGS has been performed, it cannot be undone. The Date & Time settings are not affected by this function.

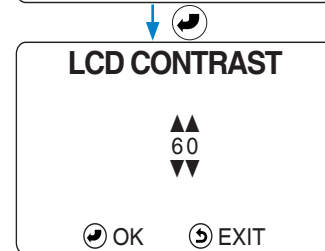
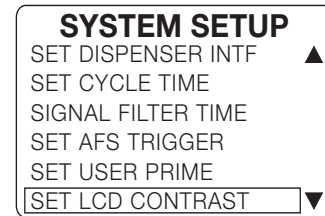

About Programming Formulas:

The PROGRAM FORMULAS menu allows the installer to create and edit formulas for the Standard, Group, Event, and Occurrence Modes. See section 8.03 Set Operation Mode on page 34 for explanations of each mode of operation.



NOTE! When using the Relay mode of operation, the installer should set a default weight for Formula 1 to enable accurate reports. No other formula parameters need to be set. An operator can override the default load weight at wash time with the actual weight of a particular load.

The Total Eclipse controller allows up to 20 formulas to be created, each using up to 8 products.

- Each formula is designated by a unique formula number (F01, F02, F03...).
- For ease of selection, a name can be added to the formula number. (See section 9.06 Edit Name (Optional) on page 45.)
- Formula names only appear when input by the installer or uploaded from a setup file on a USB flash drive.
- Formula names are not translated if the controller's operating language is changed.
- Each formula can include up to 6 products when using a 6-product dispenser, or 8 products with an 8-product dispenser.
- Each product in a formula may be programmed for up to 3 amounts (A, B, and C Amount).
- A delay time may be programmed for any product in any formula.
- A product can be included in more than one formula, with different A, B, and C Amounts and a different delay.
- Each possible product is also given a unique product number (P1, P2, P3...).
- For ease of selection, a name can be added to the product number. (See 7.07 Name Products (Optional) on page 32.)
- Product names only appear when input by the installer or uploaded from a setup file on a USB flash drive.
- Product names are not translated if the controller's operating language is changed.
- Each product in a formula must be calibrated before running the formula (See section 7.03 Calibration on page 30.)

About the "Count Pump":

A load is counted (except in Event Mode) when the "Count Pump" product dispenses its last programmed amount. (Event mode does not use a Count Pump, see 1.09 Event Mode on page 11). By default the "Count Pump" will be assigned to the highest *numbered* product (with an amount programmed) in each formula. Which will work if that product is *always* the last product to be dispensed. Instead, it is recommended that the "Count Pump" designation always be manually assigned by the installer to the last product dispensed in each formula, rather than relying on the "highest numbered" default rule. Also, if a product assigned as the "Count Pump" has more than one amount programmed, the load will not be counted unless the last amount is dispensed.

9.01 Formula Rules

In Modes of Operations that use formulas (Standard, Event, Group, Occurrence and Pump Mapping), a product may be programmed to dispense multiple times, with up to three different amounts (identified as Amount A, B and C). A product will not dispense unless at least one non-zero amount is set for that product in the formula.

Standard Mode, Event, Group and Occurrence Mode:

If only the A amount is programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in Amount A dispensing. Additional requests within the same wash cycle are ignored. If only A and B amounts are programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in the dispensing of Amount A and the second request results in the dispensing of Amount B. Additional requests (after the second request) are ignored.

If all three amounts (A, B, and C) are programmed for a product in a formula, the first request results in the dispensing of Amount A. The second request results in the dispensing of Amount B and the third request results in the dispensing of Amount C. Subsequent requests (after the third) result in the dispensing of Amount C again. The dispensing sequence is reset when the wash cycle ends.

Pump Mapping Mode:

In Pump Mapping Mode, pumps that are allocated to Prewash (Trigger 1) will only dispense the A amount. Amounts entered for B and C amounts will be ignored.

Pumps allocated to the Mainwash (Trigger 3 and 4) will dispense the B amount on the first trigger and the C amount on the second trigger. Amounts entered for A will be ignored.

Pumps allocated to the Spare (Trigger 5) and the Final Rinse (Trigger 6) will dispense the A amount on the first trigger, the B amount on the second, and finally the C amount on the third trigger. The dispensing sequence is reset when the wash cycle ends.

WARNING! It is imperative that when the installer is programming the washer signals, to allow plenty of time between triggers to ensure that a product (or group of products) will run for each of its triggers.

Programming Notes:

- Only program the product amounts that will actually be triggered by the washer supply signals.
- Program A, B, and C amounts for different product amounts within a wash formula, or use the amounts as a lockout by not programming any B or C amount.
- With an 8-product P.I. products 7 and 8 share the same trigger signals (respectively) as products 3 and 5. By programming alternating A, B and/or C amounts for product 3 and 7 (or 5 and 8) up to 8 products can be dispensed with only 6 signals.
- When using a flush manifold only one product may run at a time, and if multiple products are triggered simultaneously, they are placed in a queue to run sequentially

9.02 Program Formulas Menu

- 1) On the INSTALLER MENU menu, move the selection box onto the PROGRAM FORMULAS menu item and press the Enter key to launch the PROGRAM FORMULAS menu.
- 2) On the PROGRAM FORMULAS menu, use the Up / Down Arrows to indicate the formula to be configured and press the Enter key to launch the F## <formula name> menu.

9.03 Product Settings

- 1) At the F## <formula name> menu, move the selection box onto the PRODUCT SETTINGS menu item and press the Enter key to launch the F## PRODUCTS menu.
- 2) On the F## PRODUCTS menu, use the Up / Down Arrows to indicate the first product to be added to the formula and press Enter to launch the F## P# menu for that product. (F## is the Formula, P# is a Product.)
- 3) On the F## P# menu move the selection box onto the product parameter to configure and press the Enter key to launch the input screen for that value.
- 4) The F## P# DELAY input screen is where to input a value to delay the dispensing of any of the programmed amount by 0 to 999 seconds.
- 5) The F## P#A AMOUNT input screen is where to designate how much product will be dispensed by the first trigger signal, in ounces or ml.
- 6) The F## P#B AMOUNT input screen is where to designate how much product will be dispensed by the second trigger signal, in ounces or ml.
- 7) The F## P#C AMOUNT input screen is where to designate how much product will be dispensed by the second trigger signal, in ounces or ml.
- 8) The Right Arrow can be used to test a product delivery amount when the selection box is on a product amount menu item (not the Delay).
- 9) Once this product delivery has been configured press Exit to return to the F## PRODUCTS menu to select another product for this formula.

9.04 Set Default Weight

Here the default load weight for this formula can be input. When a load runs, either the default load weight or the operator-entered actual load weight for a specific load is recorded in the data log (for Reports).

- 1) Move the selection box onto the SET DEFAULT WEIGHT menu item and press the Enter key to launch the F## LOAD SIZE input screen.
- 2) Change the active digit by pressing the Up / Down Arrow keys. Move the digit selection cursor with the Left / Right Arrow keys.
- 3) When the desired load size has been input, press the Enter key to save the weight and return to F## <formula name> menu.

9.05 Set Count Pump (Standard, Group and Occurrence Mode Only)

An installer should ALWAYS designate a Count Pump to indicate the end of a wash cycle, overriding the default automatic selection of the highest *numbered* product in a formula. (The traditional term “Count Pump” is still used, even when dispensing products with an educator dispenser.)

NOTE! Only when the *last* programmed amount for the Count Pump product is dispensed, will the Count Pump feature end the wash cycle and reset the formula! Therefore, the installer must ensure that at least one amount is programmed for the Count Pump product AND that the last programmed amount is dispensed! (Or the cycle will be recorded as an “incomplete load” and the Load Count statistical data will be incorrect.)

- 1) Select SET COUNT PUMP and press Enter key. The F0# COUNT PUMP selection screen displays all products with at least one amount set.
- 2) Move the selection box to the Count Pump product, and press Enter key to save the selection and return to the F## <formula name> screen.

9.06 Edit Name (Optional)

This feature allows a name to be added to a formula, up to 15 characters.

- 1) Move the selection box onto the EDIT NAME menu item and press the Enter key to launch the NAME F## input screen.
- 2) Change the active digit by pressing the Up / Down Arrow keys. Move the digit selection cursor with the Left / Right Arrow keys.
- 3) When the desired formula name has been input, press the Enter key to save the weight and return to F## <formula name> menu.

9.07 Clear Formula

Use this menu only if you want to completely clear a formula's settings.

- 1) Move the selection box onto the CLEAR FORMULA menu item and press the Enter key to launch the CLEAR F## confirmation screen.
- 2) Press the Enter key to indicate it is OK to completely clear this formula's settings, or press the Exit key to cancel the CLEAR FORMULA function.

9.08 Data Transfer Menus

This set of menus allows the installer to transfer data (i.e., formulas, settings, usage reports) to and from the Total Eclipse controller via a USB flash drive.

In these menus, the word WRITE means to send data (also called “download”) from the controller to the USB flash drive. The word READ means to transfer data (also called “upload”) from the USB drive to the Controller. These data transfers can take from 2 to 20 seconds or more.

9.09 Write Reports

This menu can be used to transfer the laundry machine data, in four separate Reports, from the controller to a USB flash drive. The reports are in HTML format and can be viewed and printed on a computer with a spreadsheet program such as Microsoft Excel. Each report includes the Account and Machine names (if they were input by the installer) and the information included in the date range specified.

The four reports that are written to the USB flash drive are:

- REPORT_NAME_D.HTM (Diagnostic Report)
- REPORT_NAME_F.HTM (Formula Report)
- REPORT_NAME_P.HTM (Productivity Summary Report)
- REPORT_NAME_S.HTM (Settings Report)

NOTE! Between 2-3 month’s of report data can be held in the controller’s memory, depending upon machine usage. Once the memory is full, new data will overwrite the oldest data. It is recommended that the “Write Reports” function be used every 30-60 days to avoid loss of information.

- 1) On the INSTALLER MENU move the selection box to DATA TRANSFER and press Enter to launch the DATA TRANSFER menu.
- 2) Then move the selection box onto WRITE REPORTS and press the Enter key to start the Write Report process.
- 3) Use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor and the Up / Down Arrows to input the FROM report date. The default date will be the current date or the last FROM date that was used.
- 4) Press the Enter key when the FROM date is properly displayed, to launch the TO report date input menu.
- 5) Use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor and the Up / Down Arrows to input the TO report date. The default date will be the current date or the last TO date that was used.
- 6) Press the Enter key when the TO date is properly displayed, to launch the REPORT NAME input menu.
- 7) Use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor and the Up / Down Arrows to input the REPORT NAME. The default name will be blank or the last REPORT NAME used.
- 8) Connect a USB drive to the controller and press the Enter key to start the transfer. (If a report with the same name is on the USB drive, a warning appears. You can overwrite the existing report by pressing the Enter key, or press the Exit key to cancel and input a different name.)

9.10 Read Setup

NOTE! Five settings (plus language, date and time) are NOT INCLUDED in data transfer and are unique to each controller. They are the **Installer Password**, **Manager Password**, **Calibration**, **Machine Name**, and **Company Name**. They must be set individually on each controller. Look for this icon to find the instructions for these settings in this chapter: 


This menu can be used to transfer Setup Files (settings and formulas) from a USB flash drive into a Total Eclipse controller. If more than six setup files are contained on the USB drive, use the Up / Down Arrow keys to view all the files, on the SETUP FILE selection screen shown to the right.

- 1) At the DATA TRANSFER menu, move the selection box onto the READ SETUP menu item and press the Enter key to launch the SETUP FILE selection screen.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrow keys to move the selection box onto the setup file that is to be transferred from the USB drive to the Total Eclipse controller.

(If no setup files displayed, make sure the USB drive is inserted properly. The USB drive must be formatted as "FAT" or "FAT32" and have at least one setup file on it, or the SETUP FILE list will be blank.)

- 3) Press the Enter key to start the setup file transfer. A warning will be displayed that the data transfer will overwrite and erase all existing settings and formulas on the controller (except for the settings described in the note above). Press Enter again to continue, or press Exit to cancel the transfer and return to the DATA TRANSFER menu.

9.11 Write Setup

NOTE! There are five settings (plus language, date and time) NOT INCLUDED in data transfers that are unique to each controller. They are the **Installer Password**, **Manager Password**, **Calibration**, **Machine Name**, and **Company Name**. They must be set individually on each controller. Look for this icon to find the instructions for these settings: 

Additionally, it is important to verify the P.I. selection is correct, when transferring a setup file. A warning will appear if a setup file with an Eductor P.I. selected is read into a controller set to a peristaltic P.I.


The converse of Read Setup, the Write Setup function allows the settings and formulas (that make up a setup file) to be transferred from a Total Eclipse controller to a USB drive.

- 1) At the DATA TRANSFER menu, move the selection box onto the WRITE SETUP menu item and press the Enter key to launch the SETUP NAME input screen.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrow keys to edit the character indicated by the digit selection cursor, and use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor. Setup file names can be up to 15 characters long.
- 3) Once the setup file name has been input, press the Enter key to start the transfer of the setup file from the controller to the USB drive.

If a setup file with the same name is already on the USB drive, a warning appears. You can overwrite the existing file by pressing the Enter key, or press the Exit key to cancel and input a different name.

(An error message "UNABLE TO OPEN FILE" may appear if the USB drive is full, or if the USB drive is not formatted as "FAT" or "FAT32".)







9.12 Update Firmware



DO NOT attempt to update firmware unless directed to do so by Hydro Systems' Technical Support. If you press the Enter key at the UPDATE FIRMWARE warning screen shown, and are not ready to proceed with the update, you will have to turn the power to the controller off and on to return to normal operation.

NOTE! Updating the firmware of the Total Eclipse controller will revert all the settings and formulas to the factory defaults. Therefore it is recommended to write the Setup File to a USB drive before updating firmware. (See 9.11 Write Setup on page 47.)

9.13 Write Activity Log

The Activity Log is a more detailed diagnostic report than the Summary Diagnostic Report. The Activity Log gives added details about a particular wash cycle and/or wash operation that will aid in troubleshooting problems. The log contains details about the last 40-50 wash cycles (depending upon the complexity of the cycles), with time-stamped activity of trigger signals, product dispense signals and the flush signal.

No date range can be selected for this report. All activity is printed, from the oldest to the most recent. If the Activity Log buffer is filled, the most recent activity overwrites the oldest activity.

NOTE! The Activity Log can be erased by using the Clear Data Log menu as described in section 7.12 Clear Data Log on page 33.

- 1) At the DATA TRANSFER menu, move the selection box onto the WRITE ACTIVITY LOG menu item and press the Enter key to launch the REPORT NAME input screen.
- 2) Use the Up / Down Arrow keys to edit the character indicated by the digit selection cursor, and use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor. Activity Log names can have up to 15 characters.
- 3) Once the Activity Log name has been input, press the Enter key to start the transfer of the report from the controller to the USB drive.

If an Activity Log with the same name is already on the USB drive, a warning appears. You can overwrite the existing file by pressing the Enter key, or press the Exit key to cancel and input a different name.

(An error message "UNABLE TO OPEN FILE" may appear if the USB drive is full, or if the USB drive is not formatted as "FAT" or "FAT32".)

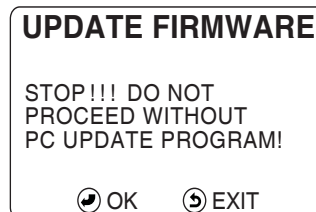
9.14 Set Units of Measure

When the units of measure are changed, existing volumes and weights, such as doses in a Formula, are properly converted to the new system.

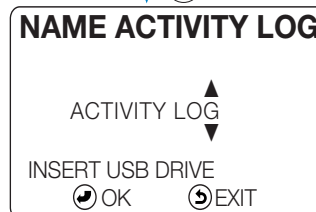
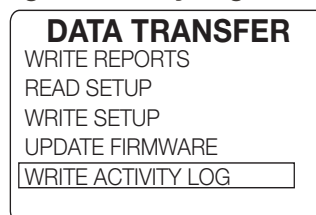

9.15 Frequently Asked Questions

This section provides information about the topics that come up most frequently during calls to our Technical Support team. These are included in order to provide help when it is most important: during installation or report evaluation.

How is a Flush System Configured?

The Total Eclipse system offers flush manifold control when used with all Orion II, Eclipse, 8-Product P.I. or Educator dispensers or upgrade kits. When programming for flush manifold installations, confirm that the “Configure PI” setting is appropriate for the Pump Interface (PI) being used and that the Flush Time is set to a non-zero number of seconds. Use the illustrations in section 8.13 “Set Pump Interface” on page 40, to select the correct PI configuration.

How is a Non-Flush System Configured?

Use this selection for non-flush operation. On an 8-Product P.I., the Flush/Non-Flush Selection Jumper must be in the non-flush position to enable non-flush operation.

Eclipse Dispensers with Flush (up to 6 products)

This is the factory default P.I. This selection enables the flush control functions of our Eclipse Dispensers if Flush Time is set to a non-zero number of seconds. If no flow is sensed, or water flow falls below .65 GPM, an optional flow switch on the flush manifold causes all products to shut down. This provides a safety interlock in the event of low water flow or other water flush system failures.

A flush jumper is present at the flush connector on the Dispenser. Remove this jumper to connect the Flush Manifold Interface Cable. Products will not run without either the flush jumper installed or a functioning Flush Manifold connected.

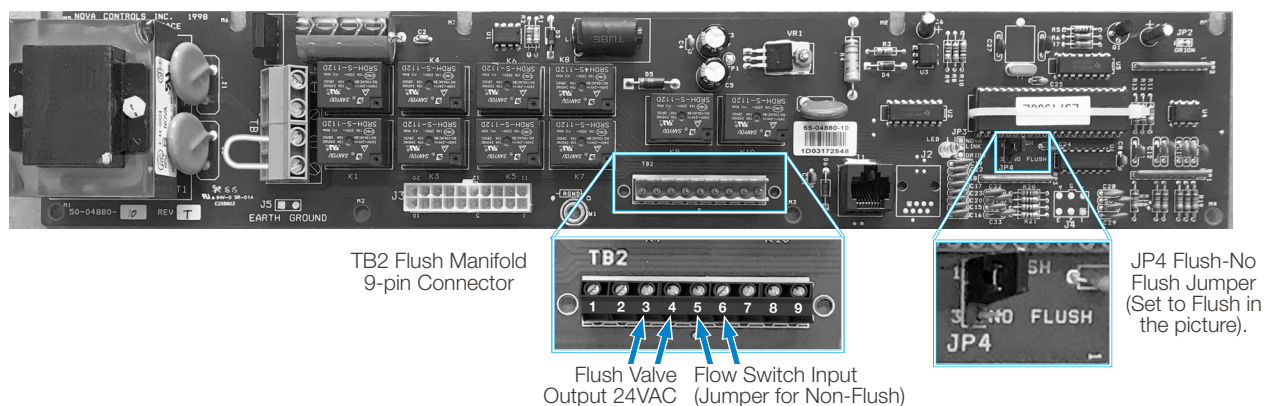
Orion 2 Dispensers (up to 6 products) with Flush and an Orion 2 P.I. board

This selection enables the flush control functions of the LM-100, LL-6000 or LL-8000 6-product Orion systems that use an Orion II P.I. board. Flush Time must be set to a non-zero number. If no flow is sensed, or water flow falls below .65 GPM, an optional flow switch on the flush manifold causes all products to shut down. This provides a safety interlock in the event of low water flow or other water flush system failures.

A flush jumper is present at the flush connector on the Dispenser. Remove this jumper to connect the Flush Manifold Interface Cable. Products will not run without either the flush jumper or a functioning Flush Manifold connected.

Orion Dispensers (up to 8 Products) with Flush and an 8-Product P.I. board

This selection enables the flush control functions of our LM-100 Orion series using an 8-Product-capable Pump Interface Boards. These are typically used in LL-6000 units, LL-8000 units and 8-Product upgrade kits. In addition to setting the Controller flush system configurations, confirm that all safety interlocks are set correctly on the PI board, i.e. solenoid connected, pressure or flow switch connected and contacts closed with flow, flush/non-flush jumper set to flush.



NOTE! In flush configurations, multiple products triggered to run at the same time will run one at a time, in queue. It is imperative that the installer allow plenty of time between triggers to ensure that a product (or group of products) will run for each of its triggers. Failure to allow sufficient time between triggers could result in triggers for products being ignored.

9.15 Frequently Asked Questions (continued)

What if Auto Formula Select Doesn't Work?

Auto formula select uses a programmable timed washer signal to pre-select the desired dispenser formula for “hands-free” operation and dedication of the dispensing system to microprocessor controlled washers. Ideally, use of an unused trigger input to the Machine Interface is advisable. In cases where this is not feasible, you may use a trigger signal input if the following guidelines are met:

- The washer must always be run “full cycle” so that the programmed Count Pump runs to count the load and reset the dispenser to an idle condition.
- The auto formula select signal may not be the trigger signal that starts or ends a formula cycle (first product triggered starts the formula cycle and the Count Pump ends the formula cycle).

Failure to follow these guidelines will result in erratic auto selection of formulas. For more information, see section 8.17 Set Auto-Formula Select [AFS] Trigger on page 41.

11.01 Transferring a Formula Editor Setup File

The easy way to program a Total Eclipse controller is to define the settings and formulas on the computer, using the Formula Editor from Hydro Systems, and then transfer the saved Setup File to the controller using a USB drive.

The Formula Editor software (and controller language files) can be downloaded from www.hydrosystemsco.com.

When a setup file is saved onto a 16 GB or smaller USB drive, it is easy to transfer the file (in the language used for input) to any Total Eclipse controller, using the controller's DATA TRANSFER function.

Remember there are five (5) settings (and the controller menu language, date, and time) that are unique to each controller, cannot be transferred via a USB flash drive, and must be individually set using each controller's keypad. Those five settings are: **Installer Password**, **Manager Password**, **Machine Name**, **Company Name**, and **Calibration**. The keypad must also be used to input the Installer Password to access the controller's Installer Menus and the DATA TRANSFER menus.



WARNING! All the formulas and settings that are stored in the controller will be erased and overwritten when a setup file is transferred from a USB flash drive to the controller. There is no "undo" function that will restore the overwritten settings and formulas, so be certain before transferring a setup file to the controller.

11.02 Access to Data Transfer Menu

To do the data transfer of the setup file to the controller, access to the DATA TRANSFER menus within the INSTALLER MENU is required, and the Installer Password.

- 1) Press the Enter key on an idle controller to display the MAIN MENU, then use the Up / Down Arrow keys to move the selection box onto the INSTALLER MENU item.
- 2) Press the Enter key to launch the Installer Password input screen. The factory default installer password is 01234. It is highly recommended that the password be changed from the default to prevent unauthorized access to the installer functions!!
- 3) On the INSTL PASSWORD input screen use the Up / Down Arrow keys to change the number indicated by the digit selection cursor, and use the Left / Right Arrow keys to move the digit selection cursor. Installer passwords are numbers only and five digits in length. Once the proper password has been input, press the Enter key to launch the Installer Menus.
- 4) In the Installer Menu move the selection box onto the DATA TRANSFER menu item and press the Enter key to launch the Data Transfer menus. See section 9.08 Data Transfer Menus on page 43 for more details.

11.03 Additional Data Transfer Information

It is possible to transfer setup files between Total Eclipse controllers or create and save controller usage reports (in HTML format) from a controller to a computer via a USB flash drive. (See section 9.08 Data Transfer Menus on page 46 for details.)

Language Files:

- Two types of language files can be downloaded from Hydro Systems' website. A Formula Editor language file changes only the menu screens in Formula Editor software (file extension **.properties**). These language files should be downloaded to the computer on which the Formula Editor is used and placed in the Program Files \ Hydro Controls \ Formula Editor \ Languages folder. Start the Formula Editor and click Tools / Customize / Languages to select the new language.
- To change the Total Eclipse controller's menu language, you must download a controller language file (file extension **.LNG**) to a USB flash drive. Power off the TOTAL ECLIPSE controller, connect the USB flash drive, and restore power to the controller. Select the new language when the LANGUAGE menu appears.

12.00 controller reports

12.01 Controller Reports Overview

The Write Reports function available when logged in with the Installer password generates four types of reports, collectively called the Summary Reports, which are output to a USB drive. (These report are explained further below.) There is also a fifth report that can be generated and saved to a USB drive, the detailed Activity Log. With the Manager password only the Manager Reports function is available, which will generate just the Productivity Report and write it to a USB drive.

On the controller the information contained in these reports is secure in the sense that a password is required to generate the reports and have them written to a USB drive. But once they are on the USB drive there is no security, anyone with the reports can open them, so taking precautions to secure the reports after they are written is recommended.

The reports are expected to be opened on or downloaded to a computer with a USB port. Since the reports are in HTML format, they can be viewed and printed with a web browser or imported into a spreadsheet program, such as Microsoft Excel. For complete data transfer instructions, see Section 9.09 Write Reports on page 46.

All four of the Summary Reports have the same header and footer. The header field at the top of the reports will display the following information, which is input by the installer on the controller:

- Account Name (This optional data is input once in the Initial System Startup menus.)
- Machine Name (This optional data is input once in the Initial System Startup menus.)
- FROM Date (Input each time a report is requested, the reports will contain data starting at 12:00 am of this date.)
- TO Date (Input each time a report is requested, the reports will contain data stopping at 11:59 pm of this date.)

The footer field at the bottom of each report will indicate the Total Eclipse firmware part number and revision.

Definitions of the table headings in the Productivity Report:

Table Heading	Definition
Total Loads	A summation count of all completed loads, stopped loads and incomplete loads that have run, since the last time the "Clear Data Log" feature was invoked.
Stopped Loads	How many loads were stopped without the Count Pump dispensing it's last programed amount, since the last time the "Clear Data Log" feature was invoked.
Incomplete Loads	How many loads had the Count Pump dispense it's last programed amount, but one or more products programmed in the formula did not get dispensed, since the last time the "Clear Data Log" feature was invoked.
Total Weight	A total of all the weights (default or manually input) for all the loads in the Total Loads category.
Stop / Incmplt. Weight	A total of all the weights (default or manually input) for all the loads in the Stopped and Incomplete categories.
Chem. Cost	Calculated for every product triggered, with the amount in the formula, times the input chemical cost per unit.
Chem. Cost/100 Weight	The chemical cost above, normalized for every 100 Lbs (or Kg) from the Total Weight Category.

On the following fives pages, an example report is displayed on each page or the various reports that can be generated by the Total Eclipse controller.

The first four pages show examples of the four Summary Reports (REPORT NAME stands for the name that was input):

- REPORT_NAME_D.HTM (Diagnostic Report) Tally of Product Triggers and User Primes
- REPORT_NAME_F.HTM (Formula Report) Formula Product Amounts, Delay and Count Pump (in red)
- REPORT_NAME_P.HTM (Productivity Summary Report) Total Load Counts, Weights and Product Costs
- REPORT_NAME_S.HTM (Settings Report) Overview of Controller Settings

The fifth page following this one shows an example of the Activity Log, a very detailed report designed for diagnostic use. It does not use a TO or FROM date, as it can only report on recent activity. It tracks data associated with every trigger signal, but due to the amount of detail being recorded the Activity Log Report can only hold several days worth of data.

In the Formula Editor program press CTRL + P on the computer keyboard to view the Summary Report on the default web browser. Then from the web browser the report can be printed or saved as a file.

13.00 troubleshooting

13.01 Troubleshooting Basics

Confirm Correct Calibration and Formula Programming in Controller

When troubleshooting for no product on signal, always confirm calibration and formula amounts are correctly programmed in the Controller.

Confirm J1 and J2 Cable Integrity

Always ensure that all telco connectors (J1 and J2 Cables) are clean and corrosion free. Examine cables for cuts or kinks which can indicate broken wires. When in doubt, replace possibly defective cables.

Consider Product Run Order

Only one product may run at a time in flush mode. Multiple products that are triggered simultaneously will queue up. Based on this rule, all products triggered will run as long as the load Count Pump trigger is last. Sufficient time must be allowed between triggers to enable all triggered products to run. Failure to allow sufficient time between triggers could result in triggers for products being ignored.

Suggested Service Parts

We advise keeping an inventory of the following new or “known good” service parts to use for substitution purposes when troubleshooting (or these components can be can “borrowed” from an adjacent dispensing system):

- Controller
- Pump Interface PCB
- Wiring Harness Plate Assembly
- J1 Cable
- Machine Interface (with J2 Cable)

13.02 Load Count or Product Run Errors

Some load count or product run errors can be avoided by ensuring that (1) each wash formula has a load Count Pump set to be the last product run within that formula and (2) the washer has completed the cycle and all dispense amounts are correct.

We suggest using the diagnostic capabilities of the Activity Log to reconstruct a recent history of machine or operator problems that may explain poor results, excessive costs, or both. Although it can only hold several days of activity data it has the details that may be necessary to determine why an issue is occurring.

Additional Data Logging Factors:

- The dispenser “formula cycle” begins upon the first product trigger and ends when the Count Pump dispenses its last programmed amount, or when the dispenser operation is interrupted.
- If an Installer Password is input while a formula is running, the formula is aborted, the load is recorded as an incomplete load and the formula must be restarted upon exiting the Installer Menus.
- Synchronization of the dispenser controller to washer cycles is critical. Ensure that the load Count Pump assignment is correct for all wash formulas to assist in maintaining this synchronization.
- The Cycle Timer will start on the first product trigger of a load. It will reset the controller and stop the current load if it’s duration setting occurs before the Count Pump is run. It is preferred to use a designated Count Pump to stop a load, instead of the Cycle Timer.

Load Counts Too Low:

If load counts seem low, confirm the number of times the Count Pump ran vs. other products in the formula to see if the washer trigger signal is inconsistent or if the machine operator may be short cycling the washer.

Load Counts Too High:

Confirm the number of times that the Count Pump ran by checking the washer trigger signal for the Count Pump.
